- 1. Why do you think the the play opens with a fight scene?
- 2. What is is the function of the prologue?
- 3. What sort of poem is the prologue? How do you know this?
- 4. Why do Tybalt and Benvolio fight?
- 5. There are several puns in this scene. Quote three examples.
- 6. Why is Romeo unhappy? Quote a line to support your answer.
- 7. What solution does Benvolio suggest to Romeo?

Lii.

- 1. Capulet, Juliet's father, gives her age and a plan for Paris. Report these two pieces of information.
- 2. Explain the humour in the servant's speech. Also, tell why he asks Romeo to read the names.
- 3. Romeo also reads aloud the invitation. What does Benvolio suggest to Romeo? Why?
- 4. What is the difference between how the servant speaks and how Romeo and Benvolio speak?

Liii.

- 1. What do you think of the Nurse in this scene?
- 2. Name one pun that Lady Capulet says. Write the quote and the line number.
- 3. How does Juliet react to her mother's idea of marriage? What does Juliet agree to do about Paris' wooing her?

- 1. What sort of person is Tybalt?
- 2. One piece of information about the setting, the time of day, is given by Romeo. Quote that clue and give the time of day.

- E) Think about how movies start and what captures your interest enough to make you keep watching. Now, compare what Shakespeare does in Act I. Is it the same? Is he successful?
